SUBJECT:	Approve the Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) Appointments

SUMMARY:

Transportation Development Act (TDA) statute requires the Shasta Regional Transportation Agency (SRTA) have a Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) to inform and advocate for the needs of the elderly, disabled, and transit-dependent populations. The SSTAC serves in an advisory capacity to the SRTA Board of Directors. The terms for all SSTAC members expired December 31, 2021. Current members willing to continue service, and new members, must be appointed to new three-year terms. An SSTAC fact sheet is included as Attachment A.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the board of directors appoint eleven representatives to the SSTAC for three-year terms, from January 2022 to December 2025 per Attachment B.

DISCUSSION:

As a recipient of TDA funds, SRTA is required to have an SSTAC. The SSTAC advises the board on the annual Unmet Transit Needs Process, helps facilitate coordination and consolidation of specialized transit service providers in the region, provides input on non-motorized connections to transit, and participates in other related matters. SSTAC meetings are held at least twice per year and are open to the public.

Representation on the SSTAC requires approval by the board of directors. Per TDA statute and the SSTAC bylaws, the SSTAC has at least nine members representing six categories (shown in Attachment B) covering the interests of citizens who are most likely to depend on public transit. Up to nine additional members are optional and may include representatives of walking/biking to transit. The purpose of the nine additional members includes:

- participating in the meetings and discussions to provide other perspectives;
- serving as alternates for those statutory members unable to attend a meeting, in order to achieve a quorum; and
- providing a candidate pool from which SSTAC statutory vacancies may be filled during the three-year term of appointments.

SRTA solicited for SSTAC volunteers on SRTA's website and social media, and in the newspaper. This attracted eleven volunteers interested in serving. The SSTAC provides valuable input and SRTA staff

appreciates the SSTAC representatives' service, as well as the willingness of multiple existing representatives to continue to volunteer.

The eleven candidates highlighted in Attachment B are recommended for appointment to three-year terms, from January 2022 to December 2025. To date, this includes seven voting members and four additional members who can be appointed as voting members by the executive director if vacancies arise in the TDA-mandated categories that they are qualified to fill. This distinction is immaterial in terms of participation since the need to vote is infrequent and all consensus votes are customary. The additional members are also able to substitute for missing statutory members when the need for a quorum arises, and are always welcomed and encouraged to provide information and feedback, and participate within meeting discussions.

Staff will continue to conduct outreach efforts as the year progresses to fill the two vacant statutory positions, and additional members positions. The SRTA Executive Director will appoint individuals to these positions, as qualified candidates become available, for the remainder of the three-year term.

ALTERNATIVES:

The board of directors may approve an SSTAC with a different number of members. However, a minimum of nine members should be maintained in the six TDA-mandated categories shown in Attachment B. The board may also modify representation on the recommended appointment list.

OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT:

Various social service organizations were provided the solicitation for SSTAC membership. *///The Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) concurs with this recommendation.///*

FISCAL IMPACT:

SRTA staff maintains the SSTAC through use of TDA funds under Work Element 708.03 Transportation Development Act of the Overall Work Program. SSTAC members are non-paid volunteers.

Fact Sheet: Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC)



Summary

The SSTAC meets at least twice per year to discuss, and advise, the Shasta Regional Transportation Agency (SRTA) on transit needs and major transit issues in the Shasta Region. The meetings consist of members from the public representing nine voting members and up to nine additional members appointed by SRTA. Anyone may participate at SSTAC meetings, and voting members primarily represent various groups of under-served transit users, as mandated by [Public Utilities Code §99238](#).

Mission

Review, recommend, and promote the development and use of accessible transportation services within the Shasta Region.

Overview of SSTAC Participation

1. Advise on needs of transit dependent and transit disadvantaged persons (see categories below)
2. Identify unmet transit needs
3. Review and recommend SRTA action on unmet transit needs
4. Advise on major transportation issues, including coordination and consolidation of transit

SSTAC composition and conduct are subject to the provisions of [Public Utilities Code §99238](#) and SRTA's [SSTAC Bylaws](#).

Voting Members

SRTA strives to attain geographic and minority representation among the SSTAC membership from a broad representation of providers and the public. Voting members serve three-year terms and may be reappointed. SSTAC representatives consist of the categories listed below.

Categories of SSTAC Voting Membership

- (1) One representative of existing transit users who is 60 years of age or older.
- (2) One representative of existing transit users who is disabled.
- (3) Two representatives of the local social service providers for seniors, including one representative of a social service transportation provider, if one exists.
- (4) Two representatives of local social service providers for the disabled, including one representative of a social service transportation provider, if one exists.
- (5) One representative of a local social service provider for persons of limited means.
- (6) Two representatives from the local consolidated transportation service agency, if one exists, including one representative from an operator, if one exists.
- (7) The transportation planning agency may appoint up to nine additional representatives, including representatives of residents walking and cycling to/from transit, to participate at SSTAC meetings and serve as an alternate for any of the nine statutory members, if needed.
